

Vivaldi Jean-Marie, Ph.D is a professor of Philosophy at the City University of New York and holds an ongoing appointment as an adjunct Professor of Philosophy at the Institute for Research in African-American Studies at Columbia University.

He is the author of four books: Vodou Cosmology and the Haitian Revolution in the Enlightenment Ideals of Kant and Hegel (University of the West Indies Press, 2018), Reflections on Jean Améry: Torture, Resentment, and Homelessness as the Mind's Limits (Palgrave MacMillan, 2018), Kierkegaard: History and Eternal Happiness (Rowman & Littlefield, 2008), and Fanon: Collective Ethics and Humanism (Peter Lang, 2007). He has also published peer-reviewed articles in Gnosis, The Western Journal of Black Studies, Souls, and the CLR James Journal.

He was a Scholar-in-Residence at Hertford College, University of Oxford during Summer 2015. Vivaldi Jean-Marie received his Ph.D. in Philosophy from the New School for Social Research. He is currently working on a book manuscript, Rastafari Cosmology and the Ethos of Blackness.
